Building Bridges across Canada

Gov Gertrud: I look back with joy at our gathering at the Soroptimist International Convention in Dublin. Twenty-eight Canadian Soroptimists from East and West convened to share a delightful meal at the Urban Brewery. The exchange of chatter and laughter became a testimony to the friendship and joy that binds us.

Gov Suzanne: Then came the idea to produce a Canadian Soroptimist Newsletter. There is so much to say, we're still refining it. Join in - it's a wonderful way to get to know who and what are in our sister Regions.

Gov Gertrud: A standout achievement was the online NGO event "Roads to Overcoming Poverty," to showcase Canadian narratives. The compelling stories shared by LYD award winners, alongside insights from esteemed politicians, shed light on the multifaceted challenges faced by newcomers and highlighted the urgent need for action.

Gov Suzanne: Then we both got word that our top Region LYD winners are Federation winners! Although it's not something we did, we feel very proud.

We look ahead to more Canadian collaborations. Both Region Boards support developing the Soroptimist Leadership institute as a benefit of membership that attracts young women and builds our succession planning, and members are starting work on rolling out a terrific program.

Gov Gertrud: I also look forward to our project to uncover the rich history of Canadian Soroptimist clubs. Exploring our collective heritage, we will uncover valuable insights to celebrate the forthcoming 100-year milestone of Soroptimist in Canada in 2026. These projects hold great promise and excitement for the road ahead.

Club Profile—SI Courtenay 80 Year Anniversary

Fifteen Charter Members plus guests and dignitaries attended the Charter Banquet of Soroptimist International of Courtenay on 24 March 1944 with Kay LANGE (later JANCOWSKI), a young pharmacist, as Charter President and SI Chilliwack as the 'mother club' where Kay had been a member for two years prior to moving to Vancouver Island. We cherish the first History Album full of congratulatory messages. Although Kay married and raised a family in Alert Bay

before returning to the Valley, she maintained her membership until her death in 2010 at age 92, a 69 year Soroptimist and a recipient of WCR Frances Wagner 'Woman of Achievement Award'. Long membership and friendships were also held by other Charter members or those who joined soon after. These include sisters Cherry and Mamie AITKEN and sisters Maudy and Bev (nee URQUHART). The AITKEN sisters' legacy to the club in 2015 enabled us to make major donations to local organizations that the club supported for many years e.g., Transition Society and an Infant and Child Day Care providing parenting support on grounds of a high School.

SI Courtenay was soon contributing to the local community and internationally. They became known for their fundraising teas and formal balls (the first, in January 1945, raised funds to assist in restoration of the city of Coventry, England), Christmas parties for OAPs, participation in 'Skattered skits' competitions with other Service Clubs, floats in Empire Day and Dominion Day parades, and selling TB Christmas Seals for 22 years. Making 1,000 Soroptimist Christmas puddings in November 1973 was the beginning of this major fundraiser for over 30 years. SI Courtenay was one of the last Canadian Soroptimist clubs to continue holding Youth Citizenship Forums and annually presented Violet Richardson Citizenship Awards starting in 1969, high school bursaries in names of deceased members and then from BC Gaming funds and later expanding to North Island College students, and 'Live Your Dream Awards' (formerly 'TAP' and then 'WOA'). Our Mentoring Day "Yes You Can" was a role model for SIA's now Dream It Be It'.

Friendship Links established decades ago with Soroptimist clubs in England (former SI Leamington-Warwick), Wales (SI Bridgend & District) and Japan (SI Osaka-Naniwa) continue to provide a special connection internationally to share about projects and sometimes to contribute to them, learn about different cultures and form long time friendships. We enjoy meeting members at International Conventions, have home hosted and been given hospitality in England and Wales, were treated royally to Expo '90 in Osaka during SIA Convention in Kyoto, email regularly, exchange Christmas cards, zoomed during Covid, and twice attended each other's major anniversary celebrations. Although the English club sadly folded in 2021 after more than 80 years of service, they continue to keep in contact.

- ✿ We have created "wholesale" options for clubs to earn a bit more profit by packaging their own tea, or slightly less by purchasing it packaged.
- ✿ These teas make great speaker/participation gifts or for those who own their own businesses, they make perfect customer/vendor appreciation gifts.

Retail Price: \$18./bag

Clubs cannot sell for less, unless to another club member. The recommended price for a member: \$15.

Wholesale Price: \$13./bag (packaged)

Minimum order 20 bags, any blend combination. Example profit: 20 bags @ a profit of \$5.= \$100. (buy @ \$13./sell @ \$18.) Pretty easy money for just re-selling our very own branded tea! Some clubs have chosen to purchase teas at \$13. and sell to members within their club for \$18. as a mini fundraiser. So many choices!

Currently, the labels on the teas say "Courtenay" but a new label is in the works to remove this word.

The teas will then be a universal fit for all clubs. We recommend that each club adds its own re-order label with club information so you don't miss a sale from your contacts.



Wholesale Price: \$10/bag (loose)

You can make more profit by packaging your own bags with a minimum order of 50 bags at only \$10./bag. That's a \$400. profit and a fun club activity. Bags & labels are included of course. Our club packaged 200 bags of tea in two hours.

Maxine Tenander

The ECR Board is saddened to announce the passing of Maxine Tenander on the afternoon of Saturday, March 23, 2024 with her family by her side.

Maxine is a graduate of the Faculty of Pharmacy at the University of Toronto. The members of SI Thunder Bay were pleased to welcome Maxine as a new member when she joined on December 1, 1987. She was an active board member who chaired many committees and fundraisers. She attended ECR Spring Conferences as well as SIA Conventions. Maxine was President of SI Thunder Bay in 1993-95. She was instrumental in establishing the addition of the Soroptimist Memorial Garden in recognition of past Soroptimist members. This garden was dedicated at the SI Thunder Bay's Garden party celebrating SIA's 100th anniversary.

Over the years, Maxine was the recipient of awards in recognition for her service to her profession, her clients, and many organizations she took leadership roles in. In 1995, she was recognized with the Canadian Pharmacist of the Year award.



Corrine Rivers

Corinne Margaret Rivers was born on November 26, 1950, and started her next great adventure on Monday, January 29, 2024, after a long battle with cancer.

Corinne was a founding member of clubs in Cambridge and York Region and was a member of clubs in Toronto and Hong Kong. She served in many capacities locally, regionally, and nationally, including serving on the Board of Directors of the Soroptimist Foundation of Canada. Corinne was so proud of the network of Soroptimist sisters around the world and was responsible for bringing many of us into the world of SI.

Doreen Janko

Doreen Janko was a very memorable character to all Soroptimists she met. We lost Doreen July 2, 2023 very peacefully and on her own terms, which was the only way she would have had it!

Doreen was a force unto her own. She started her career as a writer in radio, television and print, at a time when women stayed home and kept a nice home. Her professional career continued until Doreen and husband Stanley moved to Osoyoos in the mid 70s where they became very caring and involved citizens in their new community.



In the 1980s Doreen was introduced to Soroptimist. The Soroptimist vision was ideal to her and with many of her like-minded friends they chartered SI Osoyoos in 1984. Among the many hats Doreen wore, I am sure many of you will remember her alter ego, the Queen. If you attended Conference in Osoyoos in 2015 then you met the Queen. She is a former Frances Wagner winner; this was a very proud moment for her and actually left her with nothing to say (a rare moment, indeed). Soroptimists and the incredible work we do was always at her heart.

In April 2023 Doreen attended SI Canada West Online club's Pink Tea. Doreen had never experienced Zoom and she could not understand how a club could actually work without meeting in person. The Pink Tea opened her eyes to a whole new world and she was sold! The experience was so impressive she felt the need to write about it. Her article was published in the Western Canada newsletter a couple of months before she passed, her final Soroptimist contribution.



Marie Noon

Marie Noon was born in 1932 on a homestead near Roasvear, Alberta. Mary was her real name, but there were so many girls named Mary in the one-room school that she went by Marie and used that name ever since.

Marie moved to Edmonton as a teenager, and in 1950 married Elmer Noon. They raised three children and had five grandchildren. She worked in a bakery when the kids were young, and then studied to become a nurse's aide and resident companion to seniors. She had many talents as a photographer, handicrafter and artist, winning prizes in local exhibitions and selling her work in several stores.

Marie was active in sports and belonged to many organizations. She sewed with Days for Girls and knitted baby outfits for an Edmonton hospital. With her daughter Jaynne, a member of SI Edmonton, she attended club events and helped with projects. In 2016 Marie became a Soroptimist, and as a member attended leadership retreats and several Region Conferences.

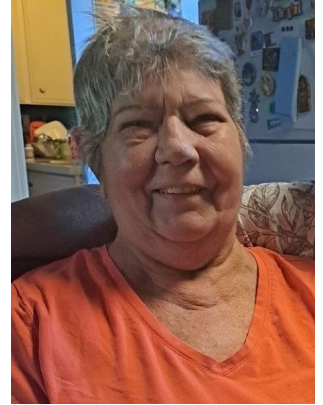
Marie loved being a "Chippie" (chip runner) for SI Edmonton casinos and working registration tables at club events. Marie and Jaynne traveled to Stoyaniv in Western Ukraine in 2017 to visit the Maple Leaf House for girls, a project of the NASHI group—a volunteer organization fighting human trafficking. SI Edmonton had donated \$5000, and Marie and Jaynne saw the Maple Leaf in the girls' dining room acknowledging that donation.

Donna Bradley passed away on October 20, 2023. When her cancer became untreatable she went to her church and spoke with the Pastor to make sure that the service for her would be the way she wanted it to be. She jokingly said we better say something nice about her!!! She had a real sense of humour even in these dire circumstances.

Donna was a member of SI Surrey Delta for 15 years. She didn't have a high education but early on she became an avid advocate for women's rights. Donna had aboriginal blood and therefore was passionate about the rights of that culture. Donna had a lifetime of selfless dedication to service for women and their families. In addition to her extensive work on Resolutions for the Provincial Council of Women, she was active for many years in the Business and Professional Women's Association. And a founding Board Member of Servants Anonymous Society in Surrey that was established in the year 2000. Taking women off the streets and giving them a chance for a new productive life, was close to her heart.



Donna had a superpower. When a social issue arose, either locally, provincially or federally, Donna was right there to call a politician who was connected to that issue. I'm certain she was on a first name basis with all of them. She was relentless in her quest to make our world a better place, especially for women and children.

Dream It, Be It—Youth Report

This is the script of a speech by two young women who have participated in SI Chilliwack's Dream It, Be It.



Hi I'm Alexis and I'm Alexa.

We were so excited to be given this opportunity to share our experience with Dream It, Be It. We both went to this event in our first year in high school and we liked it so much that we went to it the next year as well.

In grade nine, we were introduced to this program by our work experience teacher who thought this program would be perfect for us. And it was. We had no idea what to expect when we first got invited other than it was for women and young girls like ourselves. We were met by a lovely group of women who planned an entire day of things to do to learn about ourselves and explore our futures.

We did many activities to explore our personalities to align us with a career fitting to our interests,



hobbies, and personality. We also did things like yoga, breathing exercises, and games. We got to hear from guest speakers who talked about their struggles that they went through as women to get where they are in their lives and careers. We were able to ask them questions about why they chose that career path and how it had changed so many

times. This was comforting to know about because it is hard to decide what we want to do, and to know that we can try so many things is relieving.

Our favourite part of the day was when we had the chance to talk to all of the women running the event. We set up our chair and desks in a circle and went around to do individual Q&As with each Dream It, Be It mentor. We got to ask them questions about their life experiences like if they had ever experienced work place harassment, how they dealt with wavering self confidence, and how they balanced their home lives and work lives. These are all tough situations that women go through and it was eye opening to hear how some of the women had gone through these things and how it affected them.

Getting to hear about some of the experiences that shaped these women was so special because this opened my eyes to be able to see women not as unrelatable adults, but as girls who have been through the same things I'm going through and who have shown me that I am not going through these experiences alone and that I'm on the right path.

In my personality test, I learned that I value financial reward, stability, and intellectual stimulation. This aligned to jobs like doctors, CEOs, and managers. Although I'm still unsure of what I want to pursue, and I change my mind every week, it still helped me realize careers that I know I don't want to do and don't think would be a good fit at all like a counselor, social worker or anything in trades.

We've interacted with the Soroptimist club a few times over our high school years so this January when Lori reached out and asked us to speak to you all we jumped at the opportunity! But since we just started a new semester at school, we definitely procrastinated writing this speech, but when we finally did we sat down in my room and reflected about our time at the Dream It, Be It event and how much it has impacted us in our lives and the way we make decisions for our future.

Overall, we are so grateful to be here telling you about this event that has impacted not only us, but so many other girls worldwide. We are both looking forward to continuing our involvement with the Soroptimist club. Thanks for listening!
