## **Governor's Message**

"The smallest drop of information can have ripples."

 Berthe De Vos, SI United Nations Representative, Geneva.
 WCR Webinar, "Violence Against Women in Conflict Zones", Dec 10,



Western Canada Region, along with SI Toronto, hosted a webinar on December 10, World Human Rights Day, about human rights violations against women in conflict zones - Iran, Afghanistan, Ukraine - and what Soroptimists can do, and are doing, to take action.

Yes, we heard about the horrors of systematic rape, human trafficking by organized crime, brutal repression. We also heard how we, as Soroptimists, can help these women and the bigger, global push for human rights.

Cross-county projects that reach refugees have immediate effect. Medical supplies for Iran, where injured activists fear going to a hospital. Welcome packs for Ukrainian refugees. Remember the \$13,000+ that we as a Region raised through Perogies for Ukraine? That bought a lot of welcome.

Aside from funds or supplies, we can send support. "Speak up to your local communities," said Berthe. "It creates awareness." For example, copy the blog post on our website about Iran. Send it to all levels of politicians in your club's name. Voice your support on social media.

And even more important in the long game is information. Berthe said, "Discover the problems in your area, and build projects on those problems that link to the pillars of Soroptimist. Network with local authorities. Collect data on the problems and the impact."

Our Federation says the same thing. All levels of fundraisers will tell you that sponsors love data that shows impact, whether it is on one woman's or family's life, a cohort of girls, a community. So do our advocates at the UN love information. They collate what is happening in our clubsin 122 countries - and use it to advocate for women's rights. Because women's rights are human rights. And because Soroptimist is the largest global network of volunteer women empowering women, we are in the best position to use our small drops of information to create ripples that change the world.



The United Nations General Assembly proclaimed January 24th as **International Day of Education**, in celebration of the role of education for peace and development.

Without inclusive and equitable quality education and lifelong opportunities for all, countries will not succeed in achieving gender equality and breaking the cycle of poverty that is leaving millions of children, youth and adults behind.

Today, according to UNESCO's statistical data, 258 million children and youth still do not attend school. Their right to education is being violated and it is unacceptable.

The bitter reality is that there are countless societies around the world today where education is dismissed as unnecessary.

International Day of Education is a call for action — bringing individuals, civil society, and policy-makers to take solid steps towards ensuring that primary and secondary education is given to children, as well as improving youth engagement in education. Learning programs should be designed for the needs of different demographics, converging to one main goal; equipping children with the education needed for employment and better futures.

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## REGISTER NOW FOR THE NGO CSWG7 FORUM!

The United Nations Commission on the Status Women (CSW67) takes place March 6-17, 2023, and there are opportunities for all Soroptimists to participate. There is no charge for any CSW events.

Registration is now open. The following information will help you navigate events and learn about CSW.

First the events and how to attend:



**UN Events** - You can view UN events in person, online or on UN WebTV. To access the UN Buildings, you must be registered and have a temporary pass that is only granted through an ECOSOC accredited organization such as Soroptimist International. There is a very limited

number of these passes, and they are mostly granted to those who are following the negotiations, however official meetings are mostly available for viewing on UN Web TV at <a href="https://media.un.org/en/webtv/">https://media.un.org/en/webtv/</a>.



NGO CSW Events - Parallel Events are hosted by NGO CSW and are mostly online. You can register here at no charge <a href="https://ngocsw.org/ngocsw67/">https://ngocsw.org/ngocsw67/</a> Registration is open until March 17, 2023. Once registered you will have access to lots of information and a calendar of events. The events are just now being uploaded and will continue until CSW begins in March. The platform is excellent and you will be able to track the events you choose to attend with a calendar option.

Registration is open now for parallel events. There will be some parallel events in person. Without a pass this is all that will be available in New York in person, however, we expect there could be as many as 800 events to choose from virtually. Therefore, it is expected that unless you are part of a country delegation there would be no further advantage in attending in person as so much will be available through virtual events only. Note that on Sunday, March 5, the NGO Forum will be a full day of events to launch CSW67.

Each CSW has a theme and a review theme. The CSW67 Priority Theme is Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls. The Review Theme is Challenges and opportunities in achieving gender equality and the empowerment of rural women and girls.

# COMMISSION on the STATUS OF WOMEN



## WHAT IS CSW?

UN Women as the Secretariat supports the work of the Commission, the biggest global policy-making body dedicated to promoting gender equality and the empowerment of women, 2 issues at the heart of being a Soroptimist!

CSW will lead discussions on inequalities and the discrimination women and girls face. They will generate public attention on social taboos and broken stereotypes. They will drive action to advance the rights of women and girls everywhere.

Official meetings of member states discuss progress, identify challenges, set policies, and set global standards on gender equality and the rights of women and girls. All discussions follow agreed methods of work. The starting point is a draft document that attempts to capture the spirit of what is needed. At the end of the 2 weeks, we hope the result will be Agreed Conclusions. Frequently it all comes down to the last night with negotiations going into the wee hours of the morning!

For each Commission, discussions center around a priority theme determined in advance by the Member States. The discussions result in an outcome document called Agreed Conclusions for action by Governments and other stakeholders.

Besides official meetings there are Side Events where Member States and UN agencies in collaboration with civil society organizations hold hundreds of side events on the United Nations premises. Some of these are virtual.

NGO CSW hosts Parallel Events to create space for the public to engage. Civil Society organizations like Soroptimist hold parallel events outside UN premises across New York City to discuss a range of women's rights topics and how to best advance them. This is where you will want to be. They are hosting up to 800 different events this year. Several will be hosted by Soroptimists and links will be available at <a href="https://www.soroptimistinternational.org">www.soroptimistinternational.org</a> or on the CSW platform provided with your registration confirmation. Many events require advance registration so review what you are interested in and book them.

For those of you attending events/workshops you will learn so much. Some of our members follow the agreed conclusions that result from negotiations where it typically comes down to a single word and this is where we try to not lose any of our hard-fought wins and in fact hope to strengthen wording for the rights of the women and girls we serve.

## Anney's Closet ~ From Then to Now ~ Submitted by Claudette Fitzsimmons



Anney's Closet is an international award-winning program under Soroptimist International of Victoria Westshore (SIVW) that offers a free store to women in need in the Greater Victoria Area. In its infancy, one of the first agencies we worked with was the Boys and Girls Club and, more specifically, their Care Home Parenting Program, which functioned as a group home for young pregnant women. The Program involved lessons in budgeting, home management, infant care and other topics aimed at making them successful in their new roles as single moms. One of the Executive Director's goals was for each new mom to have a rocking chair to take with her when she left the group home. Our Club set out to find rocking chairs and we were able to pro-

vide approximately 50 rockers in total.

At about the same time, Anney Ardiel, a member of our SIVW Club, worked with seniors as a professional downsizer. She was sending truckloads of beautiful household items to charity every month. This stemmed the idea to expand our efforts and redirect these items to women and girls in the community who were starting out on their own.

After much discussion with many social service agencies, our Club confirmed there was indeed such a need in the community, whether for youth aging out of the Foster Care system or women who had escaped violent relationships, to access household items that would help them start a new life and make a new home for themselves. We approached Westshore ULock Mini Storage to see if they would donate a locker on an ongoing basis for us to house Anney's Closet. They

offered us their largest locker and some of their staff even donated items to the locker. After many months of planning, recruiting volunteers and sponsors and talking with social service agencies, Anney's Closet officially launched on June 8, 2013.

Anney's Closet won an award for Best Program at the SI Western Canada Region level and, in 2014, was awarded the Best Program Award across all the Programs represented in the (then) twenty countries of Soroptimist International of the Americas across four pillars: Program, Membership, Public Recognition and Fundraising.

Now, almost a decade later, we have five lockers at Westshore ULock Mini Storage, filled with beautiful household items ranging from dishes, pots and pans, cutlery, small appliances such as toasters, coffee makers, bread makers, steamers, bakeware, etc., to bedding, pillows, towels and, more recently, furniture, grocery gift cards, personal hygiene products and laundry baskets filled with cleaning and other household products. Our clients can stock up on whatever they need to help turn their space into a comfortable home.



Still run by volunteers, we have two donation days per month where we can see as many as 20 or more vehicles pull up and donate their clean and gently used household items to Anney's Closet. Social/case workers from many social service agencies in the Greater Victoria Area, such as Cridge Transition House, book appointments with us and bring their clients through to "shop" for free for whatever they need. To date in 2022, we have welcomed over 75 shoppers at Anney's



Closet. We keep a book of testimonials, some of which we have posted on our website: <a href="sivw.ca/anneys-closet">sivw.ca/anneys-closet</a> and have uploaded many pictures on our Anney's Closet Facebook page.

We are grateful to our many partners and sponsors who have supported Anney's Closet to make it the success that it is: Westshore ULock Mini Storage for ten years of donated lockers; Foster's Moving & Storage, who volunteer their time to make deliveries to our clients; United Way Southern Victoria Island for a grant that has allowed us to expand Anney's Closet and our reach; Soap for Hope for "Fresh Start" bags of hygiene products and the Westshore Quilters' Guild for donations of beautiful quilts which our clients love. Last, but not least, we are grateful to members of our community who donate their items so that we, in turn, can add them to our free store and, of course, our many volunteers without whom none of this would be possible.

In June 2023, we will celebrate our 10th Anniversary of operating Anney's Closet. We look forward to celebrating our success with our partners, sponsors and clients and we wish for many more years of providing this wonderful service to women and girls in our community.

We are also very proud that other Soroptimist Clubs in Western Canada Region have followed our Anney's Closet model and established their own "closets", such as Bea's Kloset of SI of Tri Cities.

First off, we would like to take this opportunity to thank SI Victoria Westshore's Anney's Closet for inspiring and giving us encouragement to start Bea's Kloset 8 years ago.

Since opening we have had the honour of assisting over 2300 women and children. At times we find our shelves a little bare, however when we put the word out on our Facebook page the Tri Cities community always comes through, supporting us with the household items we need and

monetary donations that allow us to be able to provide our shoppers with a new pillow, and other much needed newer items. Local quilting guilds provide lap-top quilts, place mats and coasters.

Our club is blessed with an amazing Sponsorship Committee that every year has come through with Corporate donations that assist us with our very expensive storage locker expense. In-kind donations are all received from the Corporate World. Our main source for towels and sometimes duvets from K-Bro linens. A Soroptimister takes his cargo trailer down to the laundry and fills it with discarded terry. Fun sorting parties happen in members drive-ways. The ones that are too damaged are given to animal shelters, mechanics and high-school trade programs.

When COVID hit we could no longer have the shoppers come up





to choose their own items so we devised a shopping list that they could fill out for their referral sources to pick up curbside. While we missed the hugs and in person thank yous we were thrilled to still be able to help them with their new start.

We started a Thank you journal that the shoppers could write in at the end of their shopping experience and we are happy to share a few with you.

"My name is A and I am so truly blessed and thankful that you've helped me from having nothing and now feels like a new beginning. This means the world to have a fresh start. This means a lot that there are people that care! My heart is so thankful. The stress is gone!"

"Dear Bea's Kloset, your items that you have allowed me to take will provide my children/myself with some comforts of home that I wasn't able to provide. The warm sheets will keep us warm. The plates will have many loved home cooked meals eaten off them. The curtains will provide shelter from the outside when we need alone time. I know in my heart that everything provided will be loved and very appreciated."

"To all who made time, contributions and thought into making possible a life for my 2 kids and myself. We came here with nothing and left with hope. I have met women with such warm loving spirits and are generous beyond expression. You have changed my kids lives and my own. I haven't had such

kindness shown to me in so long. Your generosity is so admirable and important for women leaving abusive situations then who face unexpected adversity. I promise to pay it all forward. I just want you to know the gratitude in my heart for you. Thank you thank you thank you."



## **SIAM's Closet**



SI Abbotsford-Mission opened the third "closet" in our Region, SIAM's Closet in April 2019. As with the other closets, women in transition and girls leaving foster care are

given what they need to set up their

homes.

In November 2019, SI Chilliwack opened Heather's Hope Chest in a storage locker in Chilliwack. Since then the club members have worked hard to get

and girls starting out on their own. A dream to help them make their house a home, a dream to make a difference. On November 9, 2019 we opened Heather's Hope Chest. It was an incredible day for us. 

had a conversation about the Live Your Dream award she received from our club in 2022. We look forward to working with her this year!

Here is her story:

## Where did you see the ad for applying for LYD award?

I was thinking of this the other day; I just happened by it late at night. I had just been in the shelter with my baby for the month prior. I was very fortunate to have finally found an apartment I could afford. I was dealing with a significant amount of stress at the time. I desperately needed to be 'seen'.

## What is your current career goal? Dream career goal?

My passion is working alongside families. When I was in Nursing college I wanted to work in labor and delivery in the northern communities as a nurse practitioner. I had a lot of bumpy experiences since that time in my life. I started working as a personal nanny. Helping mothers and families keep their lives running smoothly is something I developed as a young girl. Women have always had to juggle family and household expectations. Now I'm studying Science, Psychology, and Politics. I imagine I'll be an advisor of some kind in the future.

## What was one obstacle to getting your education? How did you overcome it?

One very important lesson I've learned over the years is that life is a series of obstacles. Some are real doozies and others are petty annoyances, but the magic is in how you react to the challenges. I look at my life like boot camp- an obstacle course for mental and physical training. It's not meant to ruin me but meant to build strength. Currently, I'm an older mom who is a single parent. I became pregnant in an abusive situation. I had to think quickly on my feet to make it all work out the way it did. Currently, childcare and exhaustion are my biggest challenges, but I make sure our needs are met. Help is out there but it isn't served on a silver platter. We must seek it out and ask for it. Sometimes it's God, the government, your doctor, a friend, an angel disguised as a stranger who appears out of nowhere who helps me. You must ask for help and work some of it out for yourself and be thankful for it. Being grateful and staying humble is very important for your spirit. I think most obstacles are in our mind as negative self-talk, however, that is imaginary and therefore, controllable. All of this is much easier said than done-mindfulness takes practice.

## How did SI Saskatoon's LYD award help you?

I'm not sure I would've been able to get through my first term back in university if I had not been selected as SI Saskatoon's recipient for the Live Your Dream award. I left school because of



financial difficulties 12 years ago. My life held many painful sacrifices. I often dropped out of school because of financial stress and a lack of positive support systems. Last year would have been no different. Not only did the money help me but being recognized as worthy was uplifting. This was the kind of emotional boost I needed for my confidence and self-esteem.

Why did you wish to participate in the Intern Program? What do you hope to get out of this program?

Being an Intern member is a way I can give back to a group that helped me. I've been interested in causes of this nature for a long time. This is the first time I have been able to 'live my dreams', which is to participate in university groups and to be a recognized leader in my community, while working on charitable events.

What is your favorite part of the Soroptimist program so far?

I enjoy the other women. It is important to surround yourself with others who reflect the qualities you see as strengths and who are doing the types of things you would like to be doing. The women in this group are go getters, self starters, team players, and have built success in their children, homes, relationships, and charitable causes.

What would you like to say to other young women and girls about living their dream?

There is a cartoon about never giving up. Two individuals are digging for treasure. One gives up just before the last little bit and he's bummed out thinking he'll never get to it; however, he was insanely close to all the riches anyone could wish for. The other person is enthusiastic and determined to keep going. As observers, we don't know that he gets the treasure but assume he does because of his energy. I've been knocked down dozens of times, by everyone and thing imaginable; it hurts for a little while, but the secret is not to stay in that pain too long. We must feel it, let it go, then 'straighten your crown' and carry on.

## SI Saskatoon Helps Moontime Sisters Product Drive

Oct 1st to 31<sup>st</sup>, Moontime Sisters of Saskatchewan hosted a period product drive for Indigenous communities located in northern Saskatchewan. All items were free of charge to the community as products can cost up to five times more there. They provided pads, tampons, menstrual cups and period underwear. All monetary donations were spent on product or shipping. Their goal this year was 200,000 products. The Saskatchewan chapter of Moon time Sisters was begun in 2017 by Nicole White after learning that girls were missing school due to lack of accesses to affordable period products. 'Moon time' is a coming-of-age ceremony in Indigenous communities where they recognize a youth's changing status in the community and their changing role which comes with expectations.

SI Saskatoon member, Linda Braun, gathered products and donations on behalf of the club to contribute to the drive. Linda attended the packing party in early November along with many other volunteers. It was a great way for SI Saskatoon to join the Saskatchewan community and advocate for menstrual equity in our province. SI Saskatoon collected approximately \$450 in cash donations and a great deal of product.

Just another step towards a healthy region giving us the bonds and strengths to be able to execute our purpose stronger!

"What do members need from their membership?"

1. A sense of belonging.

This means being a) included, b) informed, c) having a voice and d) to be acknowledged.

**ACTION:** Each club designates a *door greeter*. This person meets each person at the door and welcomes them to a meeting. This position works great for new members as they get to meet each club member. As a start to our RFN mindset, (Retention = FUN = New Members) it's great to thank long standing members for coming and also new members and guests. Even if we have been a member for a long time, it's nice to be acknowledged and thanked for coming.

\*As a potential guest they see the warm welcome and may see themselves being part of a club that shows this small token of appreciation.

**PLAN:** Let's do a region wide campaign. Each club designates a greeter. We (Membership Team) get their name and guide them with things to say and do as guests come through the door. Some clubs may already be doing this and that's great as we will have a zoom call with the greeters of each club and get ideas from those that already do this.

## 2. No guilt membership.

This means no bullying, no sarcasm. Be complimentary, build up, watch your tone. Accept the shortcomings of other members.

## 3. Friendship

This happens over time but with club buddies and phone trees this gives members an opportunity to connect with others and helps with #1 above to feel like they belong.

Craft Beer survivor is a take off of wine survivor. The difference being instead of the participants buying the wine or in this case the beer at a value of around \$20.00 they sent the \$20 in cash along with the \$20 entry fee and we would purchase the beer.

Because we are a small group it is hard to get the numbers of participants we need to make fundraisers worthwhile, even with posting it all over social media. We decided to enlist the help of 7 micro breweries in central Alberta to help us advertise on their social media and by hanging posters in their breweries and in return we would buy the craft beer from them. They were happy to help as it was also advertising for them. We also asked if they would be willing to add gift certificates for in store credits to which some gave free drinks or 15% off coupons, a \$50 gift certificate and a brewery tour

and tasting worth \$100. The Brewery tour went to the first team eliminated and the gift certificate to the oh-so-close 4th place team. All the eliminated teams received something.

To start the participants needed to have a team of 5 members then after emailing the request to join Craft Beer Survivor, which included a catchy team name and names of their members, the captain of the team collected all the fees and e-transfer it to our club account. We had them include their team name in the message so we knew which team was registered and we set a password for them to use. Once the money was received they were sent an email with further information and a raffle ticket. The ticket included all the team members and was used to verify the top winners when collecting their beer.

We were able to get 20 teams to enter, making \$2000.00 profit for the club and \$2000.00 to pay for the beer. We divided the beer money collected and asked the 7 breweries to get as close to \$285 in a variety of flavors of beer. The amounts of beer from each brewery varied, as some breweries gave discounts, so when we divided it all into 60% for 1st, 25% for 2nd and 15% for 3rd place we divided each brewery individually to get the best variety for each winner.

The night of the elimination each team was listed with a number between 1-20, their team name and the 5 members' first names and placed on a board and then each individual member name, their team name and number were placed in a raffle drum. One by one names were drawn and then were marked off the board. When all 5 members' names were drawn that team was out. The last 3 names left won for their team. 3rd last name won 101 cans of beer, 2nd last won 170 cans of beer and the last name won 404 cans of beer for their team. We did the draw live and also sent emails of the results to the captains.

It wasn't without its flaws but it was the first time. Most responses have been very positive with requests to be told if we do it again.
