## Meet our incoming SIA Board Member for Canada Melanie Kenny



SIA board members are elected for a two-year term. The board member for Canada alternates between Eastern Canada Region and Western Canada Region. Tanna Edwards of SI Peterborough in ECR holds the position until August 31, 2023. The clubs in WCR recently elected Melanie Kenny of SI Saskatoon to be the next member from Canada. Here is an interview with Melanie.

Melanie, you have been elected to be the Canadian member on the SIA Board of Directors for the next two years. What are you most looking forward to?

I'm really looking forward to working at the Federation level of Soroptimist. I am so interested in hearing about how other cultures handle the Soroptimist

mission and vision and what they find important. What are their challenges and how can we best address them? We have so many different countries and cultures to deal with in SIA and they are all equally important. It is imperative that everyone's culture is considered when we are making decisions at the Federation level and that we ensure every Board member feels comfortable to speak up. I feel very privileged to have been given this opportunity. I can hardly wait to get started!

#### What do you expect to find challenging?

I think the most challenging part for us all may be making sure every Board member truly understands what is being agreed to. When I worked with women from other cultures, during my career, whose first language was not English, I sometimes found that they said they understood what was going on, but did not fully understand. It is easy for subtle but critical differences to get lost in translation. I think it will be terribly important to make sure that decisions we are making at the federation level are fully understood and agreed to by the whole Board.

#### What do you expect to be doing as a director?

As a Director I am expected to represent all members. I expect to have an opportunity to hear about everything that is going on in the whole Federation. I expect to help make decisions to guide the Federation that are inclusive and beneficial for all Regions that are fiscally responsible, while advancing our Soroptimist mission. I am really looking forward to having the opportunity to make presentations for the Board at other Regions' conferences too.

Please tell me about your Soroptimist experience. When did you become a member? Why? I became a member in September 2010. A good friend of mine had been invited to a dinner put on my SI Saskatoon to raise awareness about human trafficking and she told me about it at lunch one day and said she was going to join. We didn't have a lot of opportunity to see each other because we were both busy with our careers so I thought that I would join too and then we would see one another more often. I told my husband not to worry because I wouldn't take on any leadership roles. I said that because no matter what organization I've belonged to I have ended up being on the board, but I was really busy with my career and felt I had enough commitments to deal

with. After a few meetings, I discovered what being a Soroptimist really meant and what the mission was. I was hooked! I was so impressed by the members of SI Saskatoon, the women I met at Retreat and with the work that all the clubs were doing. How could I not be part of this organization and help to move its mission forward? Education for women is a huge passion of mine.

# You were Governor of Western Canada Region from 2018 – 2020. What did you find most rewarding about being Governor? What was most challenging?

I absolutely loved being Governor. Having the opportunity to travel around the Region with the help of Governor-Elect Roseanne and Colleen Penrowley and meeting all the women in the clubs was great fun and very informative. The final five club visits had been scheduled but the pandemic hit and those had to be done by Zoom. I was very disappointed about that. I loved the Board meetings and making decisions at that level to improve the Region and help the clubs. Best of all I made some firm friends. Sadly, Roseanne



(Governor-Elect when I was Governor) has passed on, but I really enjoyed being on the Board with her. We had a lot of laughs together. I still think about her regularly. I got tremendous support from the Board and I'll never forget that wonderful feeling. Soroptimist women make fabulous friends. When you take on a leadership position in Soroptimist you are never alone. You are part of a team and help one another.



There were some challenges too during my two-year term. I had two particularly big challenges. My stepfather passed away in January 2020 and I went to London for four months to look after my 94-year-old mother until we could get her settled somewhere safe as she was unable to look after herself. The work of the Region had to go on and there were guite a few weeks when I was not able to think clearly. That's when my team stepped in and really helped out. We were putting the finishing touches on the Call to Conference and they did a superb job. It's amazing how a death in the family really takes up an enormous amount of space in one's brain for a while. Following the Call to Conference going out, Covid had taken hold. This was new to all of us on the Board and we had to make the difficult decision to postpone conference in April. Finally, we organized a zoom conference the following September. Thank goodness Linda Cunliffe, the Conference Chair, had a young woman in mind to help us with the technical side. I could not have managed without the help of Linda, Roseanne Ham

and Angie Bunting in particular. Clubs also call the Governor for help with concerns and so it

was also my job to help them sort out issues. Things always worked out for the best in the end even if it took a while to figure out best way to address what was going on. It was very satisfying to help find positive resolutions.

### Please tell me a bit about your life outside Soroptimist. I know you were born in the UK. When did you move to Canada?

I was born in London and I moved to Canada in 1977 because I met my husband, Bob, who was in the UK on vacation. We were introduced through friends. We fell in love, and got married within six months. His visa was going to run out at the end of November and if we hadn't got married, we would have had to be apart for a year and that felt like forever to a 21 year old. So we got married, and moved to Saskatoon so Bob could finish University. Saskatoon is where he was born and where his family lived. 45 years later we have four grown children and six grandchildren ranging in age from 3 to 24. My oldest granddaughter, Haley, is a Soroptimist too.

I stayed home with my children for the first part of our marriage, but as they got bigger, I went back to work. I started out as a secretary at the Saskatchewan Union of Nurses (SUN). I quickly discovered that I could have a career that would be more satisfying to me if I got some more education. It took seven years of working at a variety of courses and going to night school at the University of Saskatchewan before I finally was hired as an employment relations officer for SUN. I loved that work. I was proud to represent nurses who are the backbone of the health service. My work was part advocate, part detective, part teacher, and part researcher. Very varied and never dull. I retired in December 2018 after 25 years of service to SUN. I am still connected to the organization and work as a union nominee for arbitrations. I also have my own human resource consulting agency.

I do remember that very well. I was Board Member at Large. We were at a board meeting and Governor Heather said she wanted to get an appointment to go to the bank that afternoon because we needed to change the signatories on the bank account. I said, "if you can get an appointment that quickly I'll eat my hat". She did and they bought me a fruit 'hat' to eat at lunch.





#### Building Update Submitted by Carla Busnardo

In case you have not heard, SI Vancouver with an all woman professional team is redeveloping their 21 suite apartment into 135 affordable homes for senior women, single mothers and workforce women. The affordable rents will be will made up of deep subsidies, rent geared to income and lower than market (in Vancouver).



We were successful in obtaining the majority of needed funds in the form of a federal government loan that is being managed by BC Housing. We had to compete with all the other proposals across Canada and were the largest project awarded financial recognition in B.C. The loan and all other payables will be our mortgage in the sum of some \$62 million dollars. We are hoping that the cost of construction can hang on for a little while longer as our developer continues to find new funding. The grants we have obtained help offset the additional costs incurred each month we are not building.



The City of Vancouver granted us 6 million dollars, CMHC granted us almost 10 million dollars, federal government grant of almost 15 million and the team continues to seek out funding partners. Vancity grants and extremely low interest loans allowed us to do the start up work for the project. Thank goodness we hired Purpose Driven who are more than our development partners, they are the heart beating behind the project.

SI Vancouver successfully relocated all of the tenants from 546 West 13th Avenue with our last tenant leaving in December 2022. We are now waiting for our permit to demolish so we can get on with our affordable housing project. We are hoping to have approval of permits by March so we can start construction in the spring of 2023.

There will be a ground breaking event and we'll be inviting

all of you to come out if you are in the neighbourhood. More to follow and if you have any

This year, June 27th, is the 60th anniversary of the Soroptimist Foundation of Canada (SFC)! The Foundation is a Canadian registered charity created by, and for, the Soroptimist clubs in Canada. It is a separate entity from SIA. The Annual General Meeting is held in October, these days on Zoom. Each club appoints one voting delegate.

The Foundation receives donations from Canadian Soroptimist clubs and individual members. It funds programs related to education for girls and women. SFC Club Grants provide funding for club projects like Dream It, Be It: career support for girls, and other educational programs for teens. The main program is Grants for Women in Graduate Studies which awarded over \$100,000 to women in graduate studies since 2020. Last year six women received \$8,500 each for their education. SFC has recently begun participating in SIA's Live Your Dream program, first by giving LYD awards to several Canadian non-local applicants and this past year by funding 20 awards given by clubs to Canadian women who do not live near a Soroptimist club. The bulk of those applications went to our two new online clubs, SI Canada West Online and SI Atlantic Canada Online, allowing the clubs and the regions to receive credit for the extra awards.

The SFC Board of Directors is made up of Soroptimists elected by clubs in Eastern and Western Canada., to serve a three-year term. The number of directors was recently increased from five to seven. The current Board Chair is April Neave of SI Chilliwack.

The history of the Foundation makes for an interesting read. Ten years ago, in honour of the 50th anniversary, a committee produced a book, "The Soroptimist Foundation of Canada Celebrating 50 Years", that tells the story. This is available as a PDF, downloadable from the Foundation's website <a href="here">here</a>.

The Soroptimist Foundation of Canada endowment fund is built primarily by member donations or club donations and bequests. Since 1963 the endowment has been building, one donation at a time. In 60 years, the Endowment Fund has grown to over two million dollars.

A Red Pin is awarded to recognize individual members whose cumulative donations have reached \$500, a Silver Pin is recognizes cumulative donation amounts totalling \$1000, and the Gold Pin recognizes \$2500. For some members these milestone pins are reached in a relatively short period of time. For other members they represent several years of faithful donations.

## Membership Tips Submitted by Cari Moore

Cari, a member of SI Chilliwack, is part of the Region membership committee.

- 1. Have a "sunshine girl" to welcome newcomers at meetings, be in charge of sending flowers for major occasions, sending birthday cards to members.
- 2.Plan social events outside of business meetings and committee meetings.
- 3.We have a June wrap up party a Christmas party and a BBQ mid-summer at someone's house.
- 4. We have a member that coordinates "Guess who is coming to dinner!" 1 or 2 a year.
- 5.People sign up to host or attend and then are given a course that they are to bring to a given address the host doesn't know who is coming and people only know who else is there when they arrive.
- 6.During COVID we put people into threes and then shuffled the groups into couples. People were to check in with one another, share recipes or book suggestions, go for walks or hikes. Some really great friendships were formed from continuing to do this.
- 7.As committee members and executive be willing to let others step up and lead things. Co-Chair if new people are not ready but have a succession plan! If you don't ask others to do things and never mentor or step down from a position people will not feel included. As leadership you have to be ok with change and be willing to let things sometimes not turn out the way you want them to.
- 8. Speaking of committees we really try to not have anyone on the executive be committee chairs this leads to burnout and people get the impression that the same few people can do all the work.
- 9.We also encourage members to be on 1 maybe 2 committees anymore and people tend to get burnt out and quit. We also encourage new members to not join any committees the first year if they are still wondering where they fit in. All meetings are open to all club members so everyone can get their toes wet before diving in.
- 10.We put out a calendar at the beginning of the year with business meetings, executive meetings and committee meetings dispersed accordingly. The majority of our meetings all happen on one day of the week so people don't feel like they have to be out every night of the week.
- 11. Planning days every 1-2 years.
- 12.A weekend day where club members do team building exercises, personality tests, share a meal together and do strategic planning. Have different people facilitate and make the day fun.
- 13. Encourage all club members to attend fundraising events even if they can't contribute financially. People that volunteer are just as valuable as people that give financially.
- 14.We also offer an honorary one-year membership to any of our Live Your Dream winners and Judges and have increased membership because of this.

## Soroptimist Leadership Institute (SLI) Submitted by Janet Gilmour

What is SLI - SLI offers women and businesses the opportunity to sponsor candidates to gain leadership skills through Soroptimist membership.

How SLI works – candidates apply to the club for the SLI. Their membership to the club and fees to attend at least one Region event, Conference or Retreat, are covered. The sponsor, if a business, receives recognition on the club's social media and website, and our logo and information to display on their website.

What SLI interns give - the intern has the time to commit to attending all club meetings, volunteering on at least one committee, participates in the 5 leadership development workshops held throughout the year on Zoom, meets with either their sponsor or a Soroptimist twice in the year to discuss what they are learning and their thoughts on their future.

SLI benefits – as a Soroptimist, the SLI intern contributes to the empowerment of women and girls across the globe. She gains leadership skills and contacts to carry throughout her life. She gains knowledge of the plight of women around the world and how women can come together to be the voice and strength these women need to fight for their rights.

What the club receives – through this program the club gains the membership of an amazing woman, for at least one year, who is dedicated to volunteering and community exposure. The Soroptimist Leadership Institute is a venue for clubs, mentors, and SLI interns to empower and educate women and girls.

## Soroptimist Friendship Links Submitted by Jaynne Carr

It has been a year now since Western Canada Region Friendship Chair Darlene Jamieson and WCR Governor Suzanne introduced and hosted World Friendship Zooms and they have been a great success! Soroptimists from all five Federations have joined in the experience, sharing worldwide club and federation information - real time within our Soroptimist World of amazing empowered women.

SI Edmonton has Friendship Links with clubs from all five Federations!

SI Edmonton's longest standing friendship links are with SI Bath, England (SIGBI) and SI Nayoro, Japan (SIA). Members of our respective clubs have had the wonderful opportunity to meet in person at SI World and SIA Federation Conventions in locations including San Francisco, Calgary, Honolulu (twice), Montreal, Istanbul, and Kuala Lumpur. Dublin is next! SI Edmonton and our friendship link clubs share information and greetings by snail mail, email, social media and now by these WCR hosted world friendship zooms.

How do clubs connect and form a friendship link with each other? Sometimes by social media posted invitations when clubs from overseas are looking for a connection with a club in Canada. Such was the case with SI Dnepropetrosvk, Ukraine (SI Europe) and SI Albany, Western Australia (SI South East Asia Pacific).

SI Edmonton sponsored school desks and a girls empowerment art project in Uganda; the "Mighty Fingers Facing Change" girls' finger smear mural world tour - a visit by artist Kelly Sullivan. They connected with Dorothy Sophie, when SI Tororo, Uganda (SI Africa Federation) was



chartering their club. We have been friendship links ever since, chatting via social media.

Fluent in Hunagrian, SI Edmonton President Anita was able to connect with SI Budapest, Hungary (SI Europe) and form a friendship link with that club.

Often, while traveling a personal connection is made. Before internet was available, mail and faxes were it for communications. Such was the case when Jaynne was accompanying her husband to a 1995 conference in Japan and wrote ahead through SIA asking to connect with the nearest Soroptimist club. By fax received at that conference, she was invited to attend a Soroptimist meeting. Corresponding over the next year with Tomie of that club resulted in our Friendship Link with SI Saitama, Japan (SIA).

A few words about our Friendship Link club SI Dnepropetrovsk located in Dnipro. Last year, President Nataliya and Founder Olga were able to join the first WCR Friendship call just prior to the invasion by Russia. Since then, they have been able to attend other WCR Friendship Zoom calls and Olga recently spoke on a Zoom event via video. However, their internet is unreliable; down for hours each day and thus they were not able to attend the most recent. Nataliya and Olga are in grief by the recent Dnipro apartment bombing as they knew some of the victims. They have sent a list of the women that most need financial support from that building. If anyone is interested in helping, please email and we can send you the list. Olga is planning to visit her grand daughter in the Canadian Maritimes again and we dearly hope to meet in person one day.



## Update on Perogies for Ukraine Submitted by Donna Duvall



At the end of May 2022, Bella Montgomery hosted online perogy making classes with all proceeds to go to SI Europe's Disaster Fund to help women and children suffering in Ukraine because of the Russian invasion. Susan Barber, past WCR Treasurer, has reported that \$12,752.80 CAD was transferred to SI Europe!

Susan reached out to SI Europe for information on their projects and received this response from Jie at SIE headquarters.

Now SIE supports more than 20 projects by SIE Disaster and

Recovery Fund to help women and girls in warzones. Here are some of them. Please find enclosed the pictures that we have received regarding those projects. (Editors note: these are just a few of the pics she sent.)

#### Stefan Vodá, Moldova

Project is to assist refugees from Ukraine with food, medicine, transportation, accommodation and everything else that is needed.

#### Kosice, Slovakia

The aim is to provide material humanitarian help to the refugees by providing women with children with accommodation and basic

supplies and assisting them with the necessary administrative tasks and getting medical and psychological help


#### Lviv / Warsaw, Ukraine / Poland

The project is composed to assist war victims in Ukraine with food, medicine, medical bandaging materials, diapers for children and adults, hygienic products and everything else that is necessary.



#### **Edinet, Moldova**

To provide shelter, washing machines, beds, mattress, hygienic means, food, etc.
